Math Corner

The key to supporting children in developing mathematical thinking is providing the relevant and fun opportunities to think and talk mathematically! Here are some great resources for supporting mathematics at home this summer!

Be sure to engage in the conversation and thinking with them.

Ask questions like the following...

- **What do you need to find out?**
- **What do you know now? How can you get the information? Where can you begin?**
- **Can you make a drawing (model) to explain your thinking? What are other possibilities?**
- **What would happen if...?**
- **What do you need to do next?**
- **Why did you...?**
- **How can you convince me your answer makes sense?**
- **Is there another possibility or strategy that would work?**

Below is a list of some ideas to get kids having fun while thinking and talking mathematically.

- Count all the loose change you can find. How much is it? If you counted correctly- ask your parents if you can keep it!
- Make a schedule of the best summer day ever, what would you do, when, and for how long? Share it with your parents and see what parts can happen.
- Write down all the different ways you can make a \$1.00. (or a different amount)
- Use 1, 4, 5, and 6 to make: the greatest number possible, an odd number and an even number.
- Use a ruler to draw a shape robot. Label each shape.
- Estimate how many heads or tails for a penny tossed 20 times. Toss and compare the actual findings with your estimate.
- While waiting in the checkout line- ask your child to estimate the number of items in the cart.
- Play restaurant. Have your child create a menu with prices. Have your child calculate the bill.
- List the ingredients of your favorite meal. Calculate the cost to make the meal.
- Develop a chore chart. Assign values to each chore. (Ex. 25 cents for making your bed) Have your child create a weekly "bill".
- Cut a snack, such as an apple or orange into equal parts and talk about fractions with your child.
- Notice the length of your shadows at different times of the day and try to find a pattern between the length of the shadow and the time.
- Let your kids take charge of a family picnic. Give them a budget and let them plan the menu, shop for the food, and pack everything. For more challenge, add nutritional goals, such as grams of protein per serving and overall calories.
- Bury coins in a sandbox and have children use colanders or sieves to find them. Then have them count their loot. Compare findings and crown the winner.
- The next time your child asks "Are we there yet?" help her figure it out. Using tools like a map or road signs, ask her to estimate how far you've traveled and how much longer it will take to reach your destination. On routine trips, ask questions like "It's 2:15, and it will take 25 minutes to get to the doctor's office. Will we arrive before your 3:00 appointment?"

Preventing Summer Reading Loss

Why

Why does my child need to read in the summer?

•Children who don't read during the summer can lose up to three months of reading progress and that loss has a cumulative, long-term effect

How

How much should my child read during the summer?

•Research indicates students who read just 6 books during summer months may prevent any reading loss. The general recommendation is twenty minutes per day.

What

What should my child be reading this summer?

•Let your child choose the books she wants to read (as long as they're age-appropriate and are written at the *just right* level of difficulty).

Nurse Notes

NOW is the time to schedule your camp and school physicals!

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that all school age children up to the age of 21 have a yearly Preventative or Well-Child check-up with a Licensed Health Care Provider. Although Robbinsdale Area Schools does not require a yearly physical to attend school, we highly recommend a yearly check-up and a minimum schedule of before Kindergarten, grade 4, grade 7 and grade 10. Check with your clinic regarding their recommendations for Preventative Care. Call your clinic NOW to make your appointments for shots and physicals to avoid exclusion from school for immunization non-compliance in the fall. The law requires that all students attending public school in MN be up to date on immunizations in order to attend school or have a legal exemption. Contact the Licensed School Nurse at your school for questions and/or resources.

End of the school year medication distribution:

If your child has medication in the school health office please be aware that epi-pens and asthma medications will be sent home in your child's backpack. ALL OTHER MEDICATIONS WILL NEED TO BE PICKED UP BY A PARENT/GUARDIAN BY THE LAST DAY OF SCHOOL. If medications are not picked up by the last day of school, it will be disposed of by Stericycle pharmaceutical waste management. Please call the school health office if you have any questions or concerns. Refer to Robbinsdale Area Schools policy/procedure 597AP for medication waste procedures. The school health office staff would like to wish everyone a safe and healthy summer!

Media Center

Our focus as the school year winds down is summer reading and the return of all Forest books and computers to school. All library books must be back by Friday, May 25 so we can reshell the books for next year. Which class will be the first to have all books back? Chromebooks, cases and power sources for grade 5 students are also checked out on their library cards, and each student is responsible to return all items clean, in good condition with stickers attached. A fee will be assessed for any missing items and you will be notified. Chromebooks will be checked in during June, but there may be an earlier cutoff date for students taking chromebooks home. Your classroom teacher will let you know.

Reading and exploring over the summer will give your child a boost in the fall as school starts up and he/she is ready for new challenges!

May/June Art News

The Art Room is still buzzing along this spring! Students will have Art just three more times this school year. The year will wrap up with the following lessons, grades K-5.

- Kindergarteners will do an Aboriginal-style painting, using dots of color and will illustrate a story.
- First graders will complete a yarn weaving and draw a picture like Van Gogh's Starry Night.
- Second graders will paint swatches, showing textures and color blending and will create an Eric Carle style illustration. They will also draw a beetle, using patterns and symmetry.
- Third graders will use proportional human drawing skills they learned to create a Zulu-style dancer in collage form and will also learn to draw trees, using different techniques.
- Fourth graders will complete a personal trademark and will print them, using brayers and ink. They should have time to use architectural blocks to revisit our unit on buildings.
- Fifth graders will complete a one-point perspective drawing and may have time for a Cubist-style collage.

That's it folks, as we end a fabulous year in Art soon!

Recognizing Our Retirees

Janelle Baker has been a special education teacher in Robbinsdale Area Schools for 26 years. The first two years were resource level at Neill Elementary.
